#### **General Rules of the Flower Show**

1. Anyone wishing to exhibit may enter the show and exhibit in all Divisions.

2. All entries must be the work of one exhibitor, unless otherwise stated in the schedule.

3. Entries will be received from 7:15 a.m. to 9:45 a.m. Saturday, June 6, 2015. Please be as early as possible.

4. Entries will remain in place until 4:00 p.m. on Sunday, June 7, 2015.

5. Entry tags may be obtained from club members or at Becker's Greenhouse. Tags should be made out in advance, if possible and need to contain the exhibitor's name and address.

6. Judging will begin at 10:30 a.m. on Saturday June 6, 3015. A panel of 3 accredited National Garden Clubs (NGC) judges will use criteria as set forth in Standard System of Awards,

Handbook for Flower Shows, 2007 edition, and authorized revisions. The decision of the judges is final. Awards may be withheld if not merited.

7. The Schedule is the law of the show. All Judges and Exhibitors are bound by it.

8. Plants listed on The Iowa Noxious weed list may not be used. Information:

# 9. Only fresh plant materials are allowed, unless dried or choice are indicated. No artificial plant material may be used in any division.

10. The General Chairmen and the Classification Chairmen must be available during all judging for possible consultations.

11. The Classification Chairmen will check all exhibits for conformance to the schedule.

12. There must be an emphasis on <u>Fresh</u> plant material.

#### Awards (Ribbons)

1. NGC Standard System of Awarding will be used to judge exhibits.

Only one first place (blue) award per class or subclass; must score 90 or above.

Only one second place (red) award per class or subclass; must score 85 or above.

Only one third place (yellow) award per class or subclass; must score 80 or above.

One or more honorable mention (white) awards as merited per class or subclass;

2. Ribbons are offered in Design Division and Special Exhibits Division. Seals will be offered in Horticulture Division.

#### 3. Horticulture Awards:

<u>Awards of Merit (page 43, 2007 Handbook) may be offered in the following Horticulture</u> Sections, for exhibits, scoring 95 points or better.

Section A, Roses, Section C, Perennials, Section F, Bulbous Plants,

Grower's Choice Award (TNG winter 2008, page 20-12) may be offered in Section J,

Combination Plantings for the best collection and display scoring 95 point or better.

<u>Collector's Showcase</u> (page 44, 2007 Handbook) may be offered in Section K, Collections, and Section L, Displays, for the best collection and display scoring 95 points or better.

<u>**The Arboreal Award**</u> (page 43, 2007 Handbook) may be offered in Section H, Trees and Shrubs, for the best tree or shrub exhibit scoring 95 or better.

<u>Sweepstakes Award</u> (page 54, 2007 Handbook) may be offered to the exhibitor receiving the most blue seals in the Horticulture Division. In case of a tie, red seals will be counted. <u>Horticulture Excellence Award</u> (page 43, 2007 Handbook) may be offered to the exhibit considered the best of the Award of Merit Winners in Sections A, C, F, I, N, the Arboreal Award winner in Section H, Collector's and the Grower's Choice Award winner in Section J, Showcase Award winners in Sections K and L, and any worthy exhibit scoring 95 or above in section B, D, E, G, M, and O.

**Lucille Swanson Award** may be awarded to a worthy exhibit in Division I, Horticulture, which did not receive a top NGC Award. (1)

**Judges' Award** may be awarded to a worthy exhibit in Division II, Design, which did not receive a top NGC Award. (1)

**Past Presidents' Award** may be given to a worthy exhibit in any of the three divisions that did not receive a top NGC Award. It will be presented at the next monthly club meeting. (1) **Award of Excellence Traveling Trophy** may be awarded to the person receiving the most blue ribbons and seals in at least 2 of the 3 divisions (Horticulture, Design, and Special Exhibits). Red ribbons/seals will be counted in case of a tie. There must be red ribbons/seals in at least 2 of the 3 Divisions. This award will be awarded by the Flower Show Chairman at a time of their choosing.

#### **Division I Horticulture**

#### **Horticulture rules:**

1. All exhibits must be fresh and grown by the exhibitor.

2. Cut annuals and biennials must have been in the exhibitor's possession from seeds or immature plants, perennials for at least 90 days.

3. All entry cards are to be filled out in advance (if possible).

4. Container-grown plants, multiple and combination plantings must have been grown together for 6 weeks.

5. All specimens should be correctly labeled with scientific names. To be eligible for a top exhibitor award a specimen must be so labeled.

6. Exhibitor may make more than one entry in a class if entry is of a different species, variety, cultivar, type, or color.

7. Cut specimens should have no foliage below the water line.

8. Plant material may not be altered to change the natural color and texture.

9. Containers will be furnished by the exhibitor and will be clear glass that is appropriate to the size of the specimen. Fruits, vegetables, and nuts will be exhibited on paper plates with green napkins furnished by the flower show committee.

10. Wedging may be used and will be furnished by the exhibitor. Wedging may be visible, but must not distract from the cut specimen. A piece of Styrofoam, plug of plastic wrap, a piece of wood, or a piece of vegetation may be used.

11. Double potting is permitted.

12. Classes may be subdivided, if the classes are deemed necessary, by the Classification Committee.

13. ALL entries are first accepted by classification and placed by the placement committee.
